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The last two months have been very exciting from an AAUW public policy standpoint. On January 12, we gathered in Bernalillo for the **Lobby Corps Luncheon** to learn about 2013 legislative issues and to hear David Maddox talk about human trafficking. In late January, we had the **Santa Fe LTM and Legislative Day** and we are

now deep in the **60-day New Mexico Legislative Session**. Finally, on February 12, we heard **President Obama's State of the Union Speech**. Whew!

Somehow, **I feel more connected to issues my government is addressing** this year than I ever have before and I feel I have a say in what goes on. I feel I can even influence what happens by signing a petition, visiting my congressman's office and talking with the staff, or by picking up the phone and calling Washington to express my thoughts to my congressmen. In the past, I think I have felt overwhelmed and not knowledgeable enough to speak out. So what's

different? The Internet has made it possible for many organizations to urge us to become involved, find our voices and use them.

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AAUW has instituted a number of opportunities for us to be connected with our government. I know many of us participate in AAUW's Two Minute Activist. If you've not experienced **Two Minute Activist**, go to <http://aauw.org> and type two-minute activist in the Q box. It will take you to the issues AAUW is currently working on with federal legislators. You can follow the prompts to send a message to your legislators. It takes about two minutes and your voice is heard! In just the last month AAUW has instituted another wonderful tool to keep up with legislation in New Mexico called **CQ StateTrack**. This tool allows us to check on legislation in the New Mexico Legislature on a daily basis. Simply go to <http://aauw-nm.org> and click on "**click here**" under **Follow the NM Legislature Session 2013** at the top of the page. The list is organized by the bill number (house bills-HB first, then senate bills-SB) and includes the sponsor, title, an abstract, and

its status. The legislation selected by the system is in one of six broad categories of interest to AAUW members—civil rights, economic security, elementary and secondary education, health care,

higher education and voter ID. As of today, 2-15-13, 274 bills have been identified in these categories by key words. These are not bills AAUW would necessarily support or oppose. They are simply bills concerning issues of interest to AAUW members. We are encouraged to look at bills of particular interest and contact our legislators about them.

Another initiative of AAUW is **putting AAUW state leaders in touch with congressional delegations** to identify the issues of particular interest to AAUW. Shelley and I will be meeting with Senator Heinrich's staff next week to begin this conversation.

The energy and creative power behind these initiatives is **AAUW Public Policy Director Lisa Maatz**. Lisa is very knowledgeable about the legislative process and is a masterful lobbyist. She is a tireless advocate "on the hill" for AAUW's issues and her leadership is making AAUW a force to be reckoned with. We are extremely fortunate to have Lisa as our keynote speaker **at the AAUW-NM State Convention in Carlsbad, April 19 - 21, 2013**. We encourage you to be at the convention to hear Lisa and to enjoy the wonderful events planned by the Carlsbad Branch! See the convention schedule and registration information in this Roadrunner.

Terry Sleight Award

Jean Bahr presented the Terry Sleight Award for 2013 to Florence Ruth (Flossie) Brown. In 1934 Flossie returned to New Mexico with her parents and two sisters. The family was broke. They homesteaded south of Santa Fe on property where she still lives along with her two sons, daughter and grandchildren. Flossie attended the Loretto Academy in Santa

Fe and graduated in 1947. She attended the University of New Mexico earning a BA in 1950 and a law degree in 1953. She and her sisters were attending the university at the same time. She held a part time job and successfully sought scholarships to pay for her education.

At age 21, while attending law school, she ran for the Albuquerque City commission against an incumbent mayor and former governor, Clyde Tingley. She was easily defeated. With her new law degree, Flossie established a solo law practice in Santa Fe. She was the only woman practicing law in Santa Fe until 1965. Between babies she clerked for the state Supreme Court. She maintains this experience cured her of any ambition to be an appellate judge. She feared it would isolate her from people.

She and her husband, Herb Brown, took their teen-aged children out of school for a year to explore the western states in a camper. Upon her return to Santa Fe, she designed and built the house she still lives in. After 30 exciting years with Herb, Flossie found herself a young widow and her children off to college. She returned to public life. She was the lead attorney for enforcement of child support, chief attorney for Public Health and later the general counsel for Health and Environment. She retired in 1991. She chaired the Santa Fe Water Company, a non-profit public utility. She loved being a Girl Scout troop leader for eight years.

Flossie joined AAUW in 1984 at the urging of Virginia Lierz. She provides the use of the clubhouse at her business, Santa Fe Skies RV Park, for AAUW-NM winter Leadership Team meetings. She has informed her children that this practice is to continue. She also shares her legal expertise with the local branch.

The Terry Slight Memorial Award is given annually to a member of AAUW-New Mexico that exemplifies Terry's passion and diligence in advancing the AAUW Mission. Flossie certainly meets the criteria for this award.

Sponsored by AAUW and NASPA, this leadership conference brings together over 500 collegiate women from across the nation to think about, talk about and network about leadership. Workshops, small group sessions, keynote speakers and a banquet honoring women of distinction are highlights of the conference.

Last year AAUW-NM NCCWSL Scholarship winners were Reyna Caro, a sophomore family and consumer sciences major from Hagerman, NM, Flor Ogaz, a junior physical education major from Deming, NM, both attending New Mexico State University; and Angelica Ruiz-Olivas, a freshman business administration/office technology major from Albuquerque attending Central New Mexico Community College. Those who attended the October 2012, LTM in Albuquerque, met these young women. Their words for the conference were awesome, inspiring, amazing and life changing.

If you are interested in what is going on in Santa Fe, I hope you have kept the e-mail I sent with bills and contact information. The New Mexico legislative web page is found at <http://www.nmlegis.gov/lcs/BillFinder.aspx>. You can access the bill by number, key word(s), subject and sponsor. Click on locator reports to find bills by location or status. In the 5 years I've been going to Santa Fe it has never been this busy. They are scheduling committee meetings on Saturday. I am going 3 or 4 times a week instead of 2 or 3 times. I will send out information as I can find time. I won't have time to make a new list so make notes on your copy of bills. There are so many AAUW issues: education, teacher retirement, health (family, women, seniors, rural clinics), human trafficking, and conservation issues. Don't forget you can listen to floor action on the legislature web site at http://www.nmlegis.gov/lcs/webcast/default_session.aspx, and twitter. Remember you can't judge a book by its cover and you can't judge a bill by its title.

AAUW has a long and distinguished history of advancing educational and professional opportunities for women in the United States and around the globe. AAUW is one of the world's largest sources of funding for graduate women. **AAUW provided more than \$3.7 million in funding for more than 240 fellowships and grants to outstanding women and non-profit organizations in the 2011-12 academic year. In academic year 2012-2013 we provided \$4.3 million in funding over 278 fellowships and grants.**

In 2012 AAUW- New Mexico helped make the following important programs grow. We gave: Legal Advocacy Fund **\$2,290**; Leadership Programs (National Conference for College Student Leaders, Start Smart, "Elect Her") **\$1,270**; Action Fund (Voter Education, Member Advocacy) **\$170**; Public Policy (Supports government relations, civic engagement and field organizing) **\$340**; Eleanor Roosevelt Fund (supports research such as "Graduating to a Pay Gap: The Earnings of Women and Men One Year After Graduation" 2012) **\$1,105**; Educational Opportunities (Scholarships and Community Action Grants) **\$1,525**; and AAUW Funds Unrestricted (supports programs with the greatest needs) **\$5,005**.

The official logo of AAUW has changed as has the format of the website. Note the new logo on the first page of this newsletter. Make it a habit to check the AAUW website for updates on important issues related to women. The current site includes information about the Violence Against Women Act.

How Complicated is it?

*I am a mother
How great that is
How great the feeling can be
Only God knows the passion in me
Only God can truly share my affections
But the war between my feelings
And my thought?
Is being a mother always this complication?
Is it really a struggle?
You wanted me to bear children for you
You promised to marry me
But where I am today
A maid in one of the Boers home
A street vendor selling vegetables
Be only for your children to have education
Only for your children to have food
Because you had dumped me
Like a dog dumping a porridge without meat
Like an old teabag
Like a sugarless bubble gum
You threw me away
My pillows are always soaked with tears
When I remember the day you left
The day I became a widow
The day you gave me HIV/AIDS
This is unbearable, uncontrollable, and unstoppable
How complicated is it?*

The poem written by Nomfundo Temvelo Tfwala was read by Julie Vollmer at the Winter LTM. Nomfundo is a young woman living in Swaziland. A friend of Julie's, Kim Lierttel, a Peace Corp member working on HIV prevention education sent the poem. The poem was posted on the Peace Corp website. The following are some statistics Kim shared with Julie:

- 45% of all Swazi girls are mothers by the age of 18
- 38% have sex before the age of 15
- 36% of girls aged 13-17 are sexually abused by boyfriends or husbands
- 79% of girls in the lowest wealth quintile do not use protection when they start having sex.
- Swaziland has the highest prevalence rate of HIV in the world, with 31% of the adult population and 41% of pregnant women infected.

Kim wrote the following. "The longer I'm in my community, the clearer I'm seeing the faces behind the numbers – sick people traveling to the clinic in wheelbarrows, too weak to walk and unable to afford a ride...neighbors in tattered clothing and no shoes...children working in exchange for food. At my school, about half of the student body is classified as OVC, or orphans and vulnerable children. Yet people carry on, day-to-day, with little comment or complaint. Despite the many challenges, there is still so much optimistic about. Nomfundo said after seeing her poem on the Peace Corp website, "*I have a future on my hands and it is bright. I am dreaming big-I will go far.*"
