START SMART

START SMART in New Mexico for College/University Partners: There are three facilitators in NM. You can schedule at any time either through National or through me and I will notify National. You can start at any time. I believe it is getting a bit late this term. By the time you do promotion and planning you will be between Thanksgiving and end of term; not the best time for most students.

<https://salary.aauw.org/host/> has the initial information on Salary Negotiation Workshops. You can have a local facilitator trained as part of the package; or, you can use another current facilitator. If you choose to have a local person be trained, the person should be someone who will be there for a while. I think the best option is a 3-year license based on cost per workshop. You can always do one then decide if you want to commit to a 3-year license. You might also find some money within your institution especially if you have a Women's Resource Center; or, you might solicit "sponsorships" and add the name(s) to promotional info and workshop book. One other caveat, AAUW posts the time as 2 hours since they eliminated all the online demo time for the databases. My personal bias would allow more time so that attendees can stay and try these with their laptops or work with the facilitator to see how they work in "real" time not screen shots.

START SMART Cont'd

At National Convention Jesse Rauch told us that we can charge for workshops and/or we could require a deposit that would be partially refundable if the student came. The logistics of the second option make it less desirable. Almost all of us had all been under the impression that we had to offer these as "free." Many of us have had the situation where more people sign up then show up. Having them pay something is more likely to guarantee they come. During discussion, many of us decided we would charge at least a modest fee to cover workbooks and drinks/food if any. NB: Facilitators do not get paid; they should be reimbursed mileage if over 25 miles and should have any local meals or lodging provided as necessary.

International Report

U.S. Immigration Policy: A Wall Against International Engagement?

The above is the title of a lecture given October 19, 2017 in Santa Fe, NM by U.S. Ambassador Mark Asquino, retired. The ambassador had a 37-year diplomatic career, serving in Latin America, Central Asia and Africa. Much of his work was directing conflict mitigation and reconstruction initiatives but also the administration of cultural exchange programs. Following is a compilation of Ambassador Asquino's remarks.



First was another question. Is the U.S. dealing with a Real or a Metaphorical Wall against world engagement? There are two types of diplomacy, traditional and public. Traditional being the formal state-to-state events; often meetings behind closed doors. Public diplomacy is the people-to-people activities; aid programs, visitor exchanges, educational and cultural happenings, etc. The traditional has been in the press lately but what of the public side?

The effects of current immigration policy are already being felt across the U.S. There has been a decline in the number of international students, who have been 10% of all U.S. college students; 49% of them being from India and China. This is the first decline in ten years and may be partially from parental concerns about safety in the U.S. 2016 saw a decline in applications from foreign students, both graduate and undergraduate. In general, the U.S. is perceived to be less welcoming than it had been. New Mexico colleges and universities have, on average, 4,000 foreign students each year. That number is 5% of the total NM collegiate population. Most international students pay their own way or have assistance that is not a U.S. funded scholarship. Having fewer of these students will impact the U.S. economy. University research programs will be influenced along with missed collaborations among the members of a diverse student body and faculty.

Adequate funding for the U.S. Department of State has not been requested by the Administration but some U.S. Senators are saying there cannot be drastic cuts. Some embassies would be closed; another piece of the "wall" against world engagement. There would be some continued funding for Fulbright Scholarships but overall, exchange and assistance programs would be down by 29%. Cultural exchange programs bring to the U.S., on a yearly average, 5,000 people – another financial impact. The decline in all international visitors is estimated to have a \$7 billion effect on the economy.

Isolationism will weaken the United States.

Around the State: Gallup Branch

The AAUW-Gallup Branch launched late this summer. Comprised, so far, of mainly University of New Mexico-Gallup (UNM-G) faculty and staff, we met in mid-September shortly after the start of the fall semester. Once we discussed preliminary chapter-formation issues, we focused straightaway on awareness-raising. Since the UNM-G student body is approximately 85% Native American, members wanted to organize an event recognizing Native American Women's Pay Equity Day on September 25. Those of us who attended the first meeting decided to purchase PayDay candy bars and put informational labels on them with data about gender pay equity issues. The labels included the hashtag statements the AAUW main office provided to encourage Twitter users to follow the conversation of that day.



The Gallup chapter members also created two posters using information provided on the AAUW website. One of these was displayed in the lobby of Gurley Hall, the central campus building. The other was posted in the Student Services and Technology Center Building, where students go for advising, registration, financial aid, and similar issues. The Native American Women's Pay Equity Day event was so successful that we decided to do the same thing for Latina Women's Equal Pay Day on November 2. We changed our labels accordingly but this time had more chapter participants disbursing the candy. Several faculty members who didn't purchase the candy bars still used the dates as opportunities to discuss gender pay issues in their classes. AAUW-Gallup plans to build upon these initial pay equity events with more elaborate initiatives in the future.

Around the State: Santa Fe Branch



Our AAUW National Board Chair, Julia Brown, joined us on Oct. 28 and spoke on two key topics: our mission and strategic planning - what it is and what it is not. We used use, for the last time, the Santa Fe University of Art and Design as our site for two recent speakers. The University has provided us free space for many events over the last years. Unfortunately, it is closing.

On Nov. 11, a relatively new member, Lindsay Conover, spoke with us on her personal journey of activism. As a survivor of breast cancer, she chose to re-energize herself by focusing on local issues, to stay civically active, So after the presidential election of 2016, she organized last January's Women's March in Santa Fe. She continues to work on civic projects like better ways to help the homeless and ranked choice voting for mayor. Her presentation was truly inspiring to all of us.

This year our branch helped sponsor Expanding Your Horizons which was organized by past co-president Lina Germann and her company, STEM Santa Fe. Held on Oct. 21st, 200 5th - 8th grade girls gathered at Santa Fe Community College for 16 STEM workshops aided by over 100 volunteers, many from our branch. Congratulations to Lina!

And we are very proud to say that yes, 8th grader Natalie Payne's AAUW Santa Fe sponsored essay on Equal Pay was published recently in the Santa Fe New Mexican.

We are invited by the League of Women Voters - Santa Fe to participate in Advocacy Training on Sat. Dec. 9. Many of us participated in recent teach-in's and public hearings on proposed changes to science standards and have attended legislative education policy sessions on changes to social studies content. We are preparing now to advocate on AAUW - NM Public Policy Biennial Action Priorities.

For Tech Trek: Checks may be made payable to: "AAUW Tech Trek New Mexico" and sent to Shelley Rossbach, PO Box 251, Placitas, NM 87043-0251. We can receive checks while the 501 (c) (3) is still in process.

For AAUW Fund: The traditional method you noted is still the process with some minor changes. AAUW is now using **AAUW Fund**, no s, as standard. Donors can still indicate in the note line if they wish to direct to a specific "cause" otherwise it goes where needed.

"The AAUW Fund is a general fund for unrestricted gifts, which are used when and where they are most needed. This prevents overfunded and underfunded areas that keep AAUW from reaching our full mission potential. By donating to the AAUW Fund, you are helping incubate and grow our highly successful, community-based, mission-driven programs, such as [Tech Trek](#) and [Tech Savvy](#), [Start Smart and Work Smart](#), the [Legal Advocacy Fund](#), the [National Conference for College Women Student Leaders](#), [research](#), and other initiatives." from the web page <https://www.aauw.org/resource/the-aauw-fund-faq/>

All of these donations are pass through and IRS deductible since National is a 501 (c) (3). All of these donations should go into the AAUW Funds Account to be passed to National.

NB: statement on making out check. **If I understand the policies and Finance handbook correctly - these checks can go into a regular Branch account to be sent to local C/U; or, a Branch could have a specific account for a Scholarship. Donors could also write the check directly to the institution with an appropriate designation for the local Scholarship.**

Guideline G12. Many branches and states deliver important programs in their community that require financial support. For example, your branch may have a program that encourages high school girls to enter college. Perhaps branch members assist them with college applications and scholarship searches. You may need to raise funds to cover expenses such as purchasing books and materials or renting space for your meetings. Maybe you want to take them to visit some campuses or bring in a speaker. **These things cost money and, you should notify potential donors about the program they will be supporting and that the gift is for AAUW (branch name) (state) Branch. This ensures that donors will understand how their money will be used and who will use it.**

October 20-21, 2017, Leadership Team Meeting Recap (in words)

Mary Alice Murphy of the Grant County Beat, an online newspaper in Silver City, joined us on Friday, October 20th. With her permission, here is the article in full:

AAUW and NMNWSE hold joint conference in Silver City over weekend

Opening with a reception, the American Association of University Women and the New Mexico Network for Women in Science and Engineering held a joint conference in Silver City housed in the Murray Hotel. The kick-off reception took place Friday evening, Oct. 20, 2017, in the hotel ballroom.

Meetings and workshops were set to take place all day Saturday, Oct. 21, and until noon on Sunday, Oct. 22, in meeting rooms at the hotel.

About 30 women were expected to attend, according to one of the organizers, Kelduyn Garland of AAUW. "Our focus is to work with girls to let them know there are more options for them. Periodically, we get together."

Mikki Jemin, another Silver City woman, who is a member of both organizations, helped organize the conference. She also organizes each year's Expanding Your Horizons locally for girls from fifth through eighth grades. She said, last year, she attended the combined meeting in Albuquerque and she invited them to Silver City for this year's meeting. "Kids don't get the chance to spend quality time with women of this caliber. That's our goal for the weekend."

The third organizer for the conference was Silver City resident, Adrienne Dare, a retired Western New Mexico University professor and AAUW member.

Catherine Greenspan said it was also the quarterly leadership meeting for the AAUW. Carol Ann Council said the conference is basically "our state board meeting."

Jeannie Banks said it is also the Network's annual meeting. "We are going to cover the business we've done over the past year and talk about our fundraisers."

She said the Expanding Your Horizons program, which is hosted annually in Silver City, as well as another in Albuquerque, one each in Las Cruces and Carlsbad and two in Santa Fe, is important to both groups.

"We will talk about future plans for EYH," Banks said. "And we will talk about what else we need to do. Our focus is STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) in the Network, which was founded in 1978. We want to develop women in science and engineering. To qualify for membership, a woman has to be in science and engineering, not of science and engineering. We are encouraging women to go into STEM careers. We did programs before it was called STEM. We encourage young girls and women to take math and science." She said the website for more information is www.nmnwse.org.

Judy Prono of Los Alamos said this is only the second time the two groups have combined their annual meetings. "We have a fair amount of overlap. The focus of AAUW is also STEM education and showing girls the career opportunities in the best-paying jobs. Our state organization runs a STEM camp for seventh- and eighth-grade girls. Last year and next, the classes and workshops took and will take place in Socorro. The girls have to be nominated to attend by a math or science teacher. Each one is interviewed and they have to write an essay. It's a one-week camp. The students stay on the New Mexico Tech campus. It costs each girl only \$50. AAUW fundraises for the camp, which costs about \$1,000 per girl. Last year, we had 60 girls from 52 school districts."

In addition to promoting science, AAUW also supports Title 9 and the rights to equal education and sports for boys and girls. "We are trying, too, to close the pay gap."

Maryjane Giesler said AAUW also offers scholarships to undergraduate women.

Female students in STEM fields also have the opportunity to attend the Women Collegiate Student Leaders conference at the University of Maryland. "It is to empower women. It gives them tips on interviews and resumes, as well as advice from women who have succeeded."

Another program is Smart Start, a program to give women the confidence to ask for that they really deserve in the way of salary. It is for women in college for when they graduate. In addition, Work Smart is a program geared to the workplace. It has the same idea to promote learning of negotiation skills.

Cassie Marrs was introduced as a young woman, who, through the Smart Start program, learned how to ask and get the salary she deserved.

"I knew about AAUW from my aunt," Marrs said. "I knew from her to ask for more. I joined AAUW. I've been working at Sandia National Laboratory for three years."

Marilyn Doolen said: "We like to think we're advisory for someone like Cassie. If we can do it, you can do it, too. Now Cassie is showing us it works."

"When I was in high school," Marrs said, "I was honored by the AAUW. This year, I'm the president of the Carlsbad branch."

Women scientists and engineers and their families helped out the Silver City economy during this weekend of meetings. Friday evening, following the reception, most had made reservations for dinner at downtown restaurants. Those from out-of-town stayed at the Murray Hotel.
